Creating Youth Pathways to Employment!

The 2023 Lake County Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP) wrapped up another exciting summer with 138 high school students having gained meaningful work experience while earning a paycheck. Funded by the Lake County Board, the program offers students a paid, part-time work experience. For most student workers, this represents their first job. 138 students were placed at 24 sites, including a mix of nonprofit organizations, local municipalities, Lake County government, and private or community-based organizations throughout Lake County. Students worked in various areas during this six-week program, including office support, day camp programs, and indoor/outdoor maintenance. Student workers earned \$11 per hour for 20-25 hours per week.

Lake County government hosted nine student workers at various departments, including Communications, the County Clerk, and the Treasurer's office. The student workers gained hands-on experience assisting residents while learning about the roles and responsibilities of county government.

Alex Carr, Deputy Communications Officer, explained that two student workers were placed at the main reception desk at the county building, where they directed members of the public where to go in the 10-story building. He said the student workers "went above and beyond by walking visitors to their assigned courtrooms, translating information for Spanish-speaking residents, explaining to visitors how to get their parking tickets validated, and much more."

Student workers at the Lake County Treasurer's office learned clerical skills and provided customer service and support during the busy property tax season. Griselda Trujillo, Operations Manager, shared that she was grateful for this partnership opportunity and believes the student workers learned essential skills for the future.

Student workers placed at the Lake County Clerk's office worked on tasks relevant to recording and election services. Sol Cabuchuela, Chief Deputy of Civic Engagement and External Affairs, says the tasks helped the students sharpen their organizational, teamwork, and time management skills. She added that the summer work experience provided the students with time to discuss their future goals and plans on how to reach their goals. She encourages other organizations to become worksites. "We look forward to working with students next year and hope more organizations participate in this amazing program."

Annual 2023 High School Youth Summit




